News

- Staff changes: It's all change here at the Belfast offices, with Matt Kelso, Colin Kerr, Lesley Macaulay, and David Barnes sadly departing us, with new recruit Joan Mitchell joining as Habilitation Specialist. - Eight third year Queen's University Belfast medical students visited the Belfast Mobility Team on 7th September. The reason for the visit was for them to better understand some of the support services that are available to blind and partially sighted people. The students were very interactive and following their visit, felt they understood the services that Guide Dogs provide and the needs and wants of people with sight loss much better. The students met with all services in the team in Belfast including: Guide Dogs, Children & Young people, My Guide and Campaigns, as well as a Guide Dog owner.

Campaigns

 Since January 2017, we have been running a responsible parking campaign in partnership with the PSNI and the Cedar Foundation to educate the public. We have been asking motorists to show consideration for other road users by making sure they park in a manner which leaves enough room for pedestrians to pass, particularly the elderly, pram and wheelchair users and those with sight loss. While it is difficult to assess the 'culture change' we are seeking to achieve, initial statistics from the PSNI are promising.

The latest phase of the campaign was a concerted 'day of action' on Friday, 12 October with service users in attendance to demonstrate the extent of the issue.
