Service update

- Demand for the guide dog service remains high and all staff are working hard to maximise the number of partnerships we train. We are on track to produce 41 new partnerships in Wales this year. With staff changes particularly affecting the north, we are gaining additional help from other regions to support the training of partnerships equally across Wales.
 Seven extra new partnerships have been achieved in this way – that's seven fewer on the waiting list!
- We have recently undertaken useful roadshows and provided service updates to volunteers and service users in the north. It was helpful to gain feedback and we will look to continue these events across Wales in 2019.
- Guide dog owners are asked to ensure they have enough dog food and medication over the Christmas period. This year, we will continue to operate with basic cover on December 27, 28 and 31. The emergency number is 0345 143 0217.
