Habilitation

Your child may need specific training to help them get about safely and confidently. Even in babyhood, there are skills and techniques available to help with your little one's development. Guide Dogs can teach a range of mobility skills, such as:

- Understanding body parts and how they move
- Posture and walking style, how to skip or run
- Wheelchair mobility
- Spatial concepts and orientation, for example, understanding left and right
- Auditory skills, for example, using hearing to identify car sounds and judge traffic flow
- Maximising listening skills
- Understanding environmental features
- How to use public transport
- Cane skills
- Learning their way around a new place
- Road safety, including road crossings
- Use of technology such as GPS
- Learning how to use their remaining senses effectively



Parents' guidance days

Through these informal, interactive events we can help you explore possibilities for your child, advise on how you can support them and give you the opportunity to meet other parents in similar situations. Parents' events are led by qualified staff who can answer your questions and signpost you to further information and support.

Working together with parents

Guide Dogs works closely with parents, equipping you with the knowledge and skills needed to support your child. We empower both child and parent through play and recreational activity, as children develop into active explorers.

Guide Dogs continues this partnership with parents as their child matures and develops, helping to build the abilities and confidence needed to maximise independence and support your children's personal goals and aspirations.

Guide Dogs can also offer help with:

- Cutting through the jargon and providing every day, practical solutions to help you provide the best care for your child.
- Training for all family, carers and professionals involved.

Skills for Life and other support

Your child may need certain types of support to reach their full potential – from achieving expected developmental milestones to becoming a more confident and independent young adult.

- Organisation skills, such as putting things in the same place each time so that they can be easily found
- Kitchen skills, like spreading, pouring and food preparation
- Social skills, such as communicating effectively
- Personal care skills, for instance, cleaning teeth or dressing
- Money management and shopping skills
- Personal safety
- Familiarisation visits and transition support, for example, from secondary school to college
- Signposting to help you make contact with other agencies and groups
- Empowering you with the knowledge to support your child's skill development



Children with vision impairment often need to be taught the skills and concepts that develop naturally in their sighted peers.

Our Movement Matters habilitation service helps your child develop movement, orientation and independent living skills.
